## **Emanuele Banfi**

Student of Vittore Pisani at the State University of Milan, Emanuele Banfi graduated *magna cum laude* in Classical Letters in 1970 with a thesis in Historical Linguistics focused on the Latin-Balkan element in the medieval and modern Greek linguistic tradition. He specialized in Modern Greek and Balkan Linguistics at the Sicilian Institute for Byzantine and Neo-Hellenic Studies in Palermo, at the Institute for Balkan Studies in Thessaloniki and at the Osteuropa Institut in Berlin.



Emanuele Banfi has been full professor of Glottology at the State University of Trento and full professor of General Linguistics at the State University of Milano-Bicocca. He has lectured on Historical Linguistics, Italian Linguistics and Sociolinguistics in many Universities in Italy and abroad: in particular, at the New York State University of New York, at the Universities of Heidelberg, Helsinki, Lugano-Switzerland, Paris III (Sorbonne Nouvelle), at the Imperial Tokyo University (東京大学 – Tōkyō Daigaku) and at the NKU (南開大學 / 南开大学 Nankay University - Tianjin).

From 2008 to 2018, designed by the 'Società Italiana di Glottologia (SIG)' and by the 'Società di Linguistica Italiana (SLI)', Emanuele Banfi represented Italian linguists at the *Comité International Permanent des Linguistes* (CIPL) in whose Board he was elected by the members of the relative General Assembly for the five-year period 2013-2018.

Since 2013 Emanuele Banfi is academician of the *Academia Europaea* (Section 'Linguistic Studies') and of the *Accademia Ambrosiana* (*Classis Asiatica*) at the *Veneranda Bibliotheca Ambrosiana* in Milano. In 2019 he was also co-opted by the academics of the Florentine *Accademia della Crusca*. Since 2008 he has been a member of the Board of Editors of 'Word – Journal of the International Linguistic Association – ILA'; since 2020 he has been co-director of the 'Archivio Glottologico Italiano', founded in 1873 by the great Italian linguist Graziadio Isaia Ascoli. Emanuele Banfi has published about 400 publications on topics of Historical Linguistics, General Linguistics and Sociolinguistics.
